WORDS OF WISDOM FROM REVEREND CHERYL KINCAID









My garden is blooming!!! Last summer I planted daffodils and tulip bulbs, along with some other plants that people in the church had given me, in a small plot of land in my back and front yard gardens. The next day, I was dismayed at all the small holes in my yard. It wasn't long before I realized that I was dealing with some thieving rodents of the trees: Squirrels!! For the next two months I battled with the squirrels. I tried sprays and garden poisons of all kinds but with all the holes in my yard, I was certain the squirrels had won. Apparently not! This spring the colorful heads of fragrant flowers have graced my garden.

In the cold winter months, I had admitted defeat but just under the surface of the earth, the seeds that I thought to be dormant were germinating. Growth was there, even though I did not see it. What a great metaphor for our faith!!

Remember how Jesus compared our faith to growing seeds.

He told them another parable: "The kingdom of heaven is like a mustard seed, which a man took and planted in his field. Though it is the smallest of all your seeds, when it grows, it is the largest of garden plants and becomes a tree, so that the birds of the air come and perch in its branches."

Matthew 13: 31-33 31

I tell you the truth, unless a kernel of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains only a single seed. But if it dies, it produces many seeds.

John 12:24

Out of small seeds come plants that can nourish us, give us shade, and show us great beauty. But unless that small seed gives up its hard outer shell, there can be no growth.

I really believe that God is in the process of growing and changing our church. Just as the seeds in the winter, we may not be able to immediately see the changes, but it doesn't mean that God is not at work. He may need to pierce our hard shells so new roots of devotion and love can grow. But make no mistake about it, He is at work. Let us yield ourselves to His gentle, molding hand.

Prayerful Practices for People of the Presence

Some years ago, I discovered a book by Phyllis Tickle called **The Divine Hours** *A Manual for Prayer*. Some of you may know I attended a (then) Episcopal seminary, which is where I was introduced to the idea of fixed hour prayer. As I continued my studies to be a Presbyterian pastor, I discovered that we Presbyterians also honor the tradition of praying at different times of the day – morning, noon, evening, end of the day – a resource found in the **Book of Common Worship**. (Still a good resource for ECO pastors.)

I used the manual for prayer created by Tickles off and on for some time and found it a meaningful experience (although not always possible to do consistently due to my schedule). The one prayer time that really touched me was the end of the day prayers, in many traditions called compline.

One prayer particularly spoke to my heart. Tucked in after a prayer of confession and the Lord's Prayer, I found the following:

Keep watch, dear Lord,
with those who work or watch
or weep this night,
and give your angels charge over those who sleep.
Tend the sick, Lord Christ;
give rest to the weary,
bless the dying,
soothe the suffering,
pity the afflicted,
shield the joyous;
and all for your love's sake.
Amen.

Interestingly, I am now reading a book with a friend, based on this prayer. It is called **Prayers in the Night** by Tish Harrison Warren. We are moving through it slowly but anticipate some new insights as I ponder this prayer more deeply.

I share this prayer with you because it seems to encompass so many who may be entering the night with all kinds of needs. We can pray for those we know who are dealing with situations expressed so poignantly in this prayer. However we pray, we can trust God hears our hearts.



Parking Lot



You may be wondering, what is the plan for the parking lot? As you know, we repaired and seal coated the visitor parking lot, the kitchen access road, and ½ of the main parking lot last year before the weather turned cold. Now that spring is here and the weather is warming up, we plan to resume the repair process soon.

We purchased the machinery and sufficient rubber to repair the major cracks last year.

Depending on our actual start date and the frequency of inclement weather, it may be June or

July before we finish that part of the process.

To complete the repairs, we will then need to hire our contractor to do the seal coating and line striping. The estimated cost last year was \$10,000. Continuing inflation of material costs may drive that number higher. Currently, we have \$1753 in the Parking Lot Fund. Please prayerfully consider contributing to the fund if you are able. We will move the repairs forward as far as we can with available funding.
